Truthfulness: Habitually telling the truth.

If it is not right do not do it; if it is not true do not say it.

Marcus Aurelius

Truth is defined as the state or character being true in relation to being, knowledge or speech-also, conformity to the requirements of one s being or nature; steadfastness; sincerity.

Our English word true comes from the same root word as tree -something solid and firm as a tree. The word false comes from the root word meaning to bend or deviate. From Act 1, scene 3 of Shakespeare's Hamlet we quote the famous words of Polonius as he pronounces a blessing on the head of his son Laertes: This above all, -to thine ownself be true; and it must follow as the night the day, thou canst not be false to any man. This past year there have been many tragic events reported in the news, which were the result of individuals forsaking the truth. One lie or deception if repeated often enough can result in an individual actually coming to believe that the lie he or she is living is the truth.

To quote from an article entitled Why Truth is Essential, we are reminded that because knowing the truth is so important to our lives and society we place a high premium on the person whose word we can rely on and exact a stiff penalty from those who we can t. We live in a very complex, interdependent culture, where we have to rely on others every day-sometimes our lives depend on the truthfulness of people who inspect our food, homes and vehicles, or who pilot us through the congested skies.

Truthfulness has to be the standard in all our actions. We search out people who we can count on, who won t lie to us.

Something deep within us desires others we

associate with to be constant in trustworthiness. We must have a moral compass that automatically points true north regardless of circumstances. Situational truth will not do!

In 1633 AD a religious tribunal condemned Galileo for teaching that the sun, not the earth, was the center of our planetary system. His teachings were contrary to the accepted Christian Astronomy of the day. President Heber J Grant noted that Galileo s discovery almost cost him his life. When Galileo announced that the earth revolved and circled the sun, they passed the sentence of death upon him. The judges thought it too bad to kill the poor fool who thought the world revolved (and decided) to let him off if he would pledge not to teach the doctrine. He could not keep the truth back and quietly taught it. The judges arranged to make him lie down in front of the church where they were worshipping God on this stationary earth and let everybody step on him to show their contempt. 
